

## Treasures from the National Museum: Relics of the Ming dynasty voyages to Oman

Zheng He (Hajji Mahmūd Shams ad-Dīn) was a Chinese Muslim Admiral who commanded the largest fleet of ships of the Ming dynasty. Zheng voyaged to Oman on more than one occasion, and in this edition of Wings of Oman, the National Museum's Director General, Jamal al-Moosawi, and the Head of Curatorial Unit, Moza al-Wardi, showcase a selection of relics from these expeditions – as well as a model based on ocean-going Chinese trading junks from the period. Zheng made seven voyages between 807 – 837 AH/1405 – 33 CE, reaching Southeast Asia, India, East Africa and the Middle East. The Chinese fleet anchored at Muscat and Dhofar around 815 – 818 AH/1413 – 15 CE, and at Dhofar (al-Baleed) in the years 823 – 824 AH/1421 CE, and 834 – 835 AH/1431 CE.

## Model of an ocean-going Chinese junk

**Origin:** Made by Carlos Montalvão. (This model is based on several works related to the oldest ocean-going Chinese trading junks).

Materials: Birch wood (Betula), brass, linen and canvas

**Length:** 2.4 metres (scale 1:30) **Period:** 1435 AH/2013 CE
